

## 2003 All-CSFL Honors

The Collegiate Sprint Football League has announced it's all-league teams for the 2003 season.

Three teams placed a total of eight players on the list of first-team performers. Army, Navy, and Cornell all had eight performers on the list. Penn had a total of four players while Princeton placed three on the list. Cornell led the way on offense with six honorees, while Army had six defensive players on the list. The Black Knights captured the CSFL title by going undefeated in league play.

Army's Michael Kelvington captured the Kays Award, which is given to the league's most valuable player. The junior linebacker was a unanimous selection after leading the Black Knights to the league title. Kelvington led the team in tackles (41), tackles for loss (seven), sacks (three) and interceptions (three). Kelvington recorded a season-high 12 tackles and a pair of sacks in the season ending victory over Navy.

#### Week 8 in Review

Army couldn't have picked a better time to snap Navy's winning streak. The Black Knights defeated the Midshipmen, 30-25, to capture the CSFL title. Army fell behind in the first half, but scored 24 second half points to take the title. The Midshipmen outgained the Black Knights, 307-202, but three Navy fumbles proved costly.

Pennsylvania ended its season with a 37-15 victory over Princeton. The Quakers put the game away early as they took a 30-7 halftime lead. Princeton's Matt Worley picked up 56 yards on the ground and finished the season as the CSFL's leading rusher.

Cornell had the week off.

#### Offensive Player of the Week—George Feagins, Army

The senior quarterback wins the award for the second week in a row. Feagins accounted for 140 yards and two touchdowns as he led the Black Knights to the CSFL title. Feagins rushed for 93 yards and passed for 47 yards and a touchdown. His 29-yard rushing touchdown in the fourth quarter tied the game with 5:04 remaining.

#### Defensive Player of the Week—Mike Kelvington, Army

The junior came up with a dominating performance against Navy. Kelvington racked up 12 tackles and two sacks. Four of his tackles went for losses. He led an Army defense that forced three Navy fumbles in a game that gave the Black Knights the title.

#### Special Teams Player of the Week—Patrick Monaghan, Pennsylvania

The junior had four returns for 11 yards as he led Penn to a season ending victory over Princeton. Monaghan also scored three touchdowns on offense despite touching the ball only five times. Monaghan's returns gave the Quakers excellent field position all night.

#### Week 7 in Review

Navy picked up its second shutout of the season in a 31-0 victory over Pennsylvania. The ground game was also in high gear for the Midshipmen as Navy rushed for 333 yards. Jamie Glines rushed for two

touchdowns in the victory.

Army received four touchdowns from senior quarterback George Feagins in a 42-22 victory over Cornell. The Black Knights put the game away early with a 21-point first quarter. Henry Kim had 12 catches for 177 yards to lead Cornell in the team's final game of the season. Princeton had the week off.

**Offensive Player of the Week—George Feagins, Army**

The senior quarterback tossed a career-high four touchdown passes in Army's win over Cornell. Feagins was also a factor on the ground as he rushed for 74 yards on 12 carries. He accounted for 169 yards passing and receiving combined for the Black Knights.

**Defensive Player of the Week—David Novotney, Navy**

The freshman led the way for Navy with seven tackles against Pennsylvania. Three of his tackles went for losses of 12 yards. Novotney also recorded two sacks and added a pass breakup.

**Special Teams Player of the Week—Kurt Cheeseman, Army**

The junior drilled all six of his extra point attempts in Army's win at Cornell. Cheesman is now a perfect 18 for 18 on PAT's this year. He has also made four of five field goals this fall.

### **Week 6 in Review**

Pennsylvania's defense came up big in a 21-6 victory over Cornell. The Big Red was held scoreless until the fourth quarter, while the Quakers scored the first 21 points of the game. Senior John Goldschmidt had two interceptions for Penn.

Navy put on a spectacular offensive performance in a 62-24 victory over Princeton. The Midshipmen exploded for 49 points on 410 yards in the first half alone. The win kept Navy unbeaten on the season, while the Tigers are still looking for their first victory of 2003.

Army had the week off.

**Offensive Player of the Week—Matt Worley, Princeton**

The junior lead Princeton to its highest point total since 1995. Worley accounted for 162 total yards in Princeton's loss to Navy. He rushed for 110 yards and added five receptions for 52 yards. Worley also rushed for a 69-yard touchdown.

**Defensive Player of the Week—John Goldschmidt, Pennsylvania**

The senior picked off two passes in Penn's win over Cornell. Goldschmidt also broke up another play and recorded two tackles. He was instrumental in helping the Penn defense hold Cornell to six points.

**Special Teams Player of the Week—Jamie Glines, Navy**

The senior return man gave Navy excellent field position all night against Princeton. Glines accounted for 167 yards on returns (93 on five punts and 74 on four kickoffs). Glines picked up one punt return of 63 yards to put Navy in the red zone and set up the team's first score of the day.

### **Week 5 in Review**

Cornell's defense forced seven turnovers in a 47-8 win over Princeton. The Big Red received a combined 204 yards rushing and five touchdowns from Michael Fullowan and John Falzone. Matt Worley accounted for all of Princeton's points with a 57-yard touchdown run and a two-point conversion.

Army raised its record to 3-1 with a 17-14 victory over Pennsylvania. Army took a 14-0 lead on a 20-yard rumble by Fabio Castro in the third quarter. Senior Jimmey Donapel threw a career high 197 yards for the Quakers, who fell to 1-2 overall.

Navy had the week off.

Offensive Player of the Week—John Falzone, Cornell

The junior rushed for 120 yards and two touchdowns in Cornell's victory over Princeton. Falzone carried the ball 30 times after entering the game with just 17 carries for 60 yards this season.

Defensive Player of the Week—Mike Kelvington, Navy

Kelvington led the way in Army's 17-14 victory over Pennsylvania. The junior led the Black Knights with 11 tackles. Nine of Kelvington's tackles were solo stops. Kelvington also had an interception for the Knights.

Special Teams Player of the Week—Chris Garnic, Cornell

A week after becoming Cornell's sprint football all-time leader in field goals, Garnic booted two field goals and adding 3-of-4 extra point attempts in the Big Red's win over Princeton. Garnic kicked field goals of 37 and 19 yards to extend his career total to 17 field goals in his first three seasons.

#### **Week 4 in Review**

Army's ground game proved to be unstoppable in a 44-7 win at Princeton. The Black Knights outgained the Tigers, 412-129, as all of the yardage came on the ground. The Army defense did its part by recording six sacks and 11 tackles for a loss. Ned Bartlett had 10 tackles for Princeton.

Navy remained unbeaten on the season with a 45-14 victory at Cornell. The Midshipmen broke the game open by putting up 38 points in the second half. Five different players scored touchdowns in the game for Navy. Junior Chris Garnic kicked two field goals for Cornell and is now the school's all-time record holder with 15 in his career.

Pennsylvania had the week off.

Offensive Player of the Week—Clay Bibb, Army

The senior led a dominating rushing attack for the Black Knights. Bibb rushed for 113 yards on 11 carries in Army's win over Princeton. He was the only rusher to hit the century mark in the contest.

Defensive Player of the Week—Francis Pasucci, Navy

Pasucci led the defensive charge for Navy in their impressive victory over Cornell. Pasucci recorded nine tackles and a sack against the Big Red. Five of Pasucci's tackles were solo efforts.

Special Teams Player of the Week—Trevor Garabedian-Prophet, Navy

The sophomore electrified the crowd at Cornell with a 94-yard kickoff return for a touchdown. The touchdown gave Navy a 21-3 lead in the third quarter. It was Garabedian-Prophet's first touchdown of the season.

#### **Week 3 in Review**

Pride Bowl XXV featured another classic struggle between longtime rivals Army and Navy. The Midshipmen remained unbeaten on the season by picking up a 14-0 victory over the Black Knights. Senior Jamie Glines gave Navy all the points it needed with a two-yard touchdown run in the second quarter. The two teams will meet again on November 7th in West Point.

Pennsylvania improved to 1-1 on the season with a 44-0 victory over Princeton. Senior Jimmey Donapel broke Tommy Frankel's all-time school passing record of 1,960 yards. He now has 1,972 yards in his career. The Quakers racked up 405 yards of offense. Princeton dropped to 0-2.

Cornell had the week off.

Offensive Player of the Week—Chris Ashinhurst, Navy

The senior quarterback finished with 264 passing yards against Army and was named the MVP of the Pride Bowl. Ashinhurst went 20-for-36 and connected on a 64-yard scoring strike to Adam Matthews in the fourth quarter.

Defensive Player of the Week—Rayford June, Pennsylvania

The senior led the way for the Quakers in their shutout of Princeton. June recorded eight tackles and broke up three pass plays. It was Penn's first shutout since blanking Cornell last fall.

Special Teams Player of the Week—Evan Nolan, Pennsylvania

The junior made all three of his extra point attempts against Princeton and also booted a 41-yard field goal. The six points recorded by Nolan were his first points of the season.

### **Week 2 in Review**

The only head-to-head contest in the CSFL took place in Princeton last Friday night. The Tigers played host to Cornell with the Big Red spoiling the debut of Princeton head coach Bill Hickey. Cornell broke open a close contest in the second half and defeated Princeton, 46-18. The Tigers trailed by just eight points at halftime, but the Big Red rattled off 20 unanswered points in the second half. Cornell outgained Princeton, 482-219.

The game between Army and Fordham JV at Shea Stadium was cancelled. Fordham was forced to cancel because it was unable to field a team. The team has been decimated by injuries in recent weeks. Navy and Pennsylvania both had the week off.

Offensive Player of the Week—Michael Fullowan, Cornell

The fullback rushed for 143 yards and 3 touchdowns on 12 carries. All of Fullowan's carries came in the first quarter in Cornell's win over Princeton. He rushed for touchdowns of 8, 5 and 49 yards in helping Cornell build a 20-6 lead. The freshman averaged 11.9 yards per carry.

Defensive Player of the Week—Matt Worley, Princeton

The junior recorded eleven tackles in Princeton's loss to Cornell. Seven of Worley's stops were solo tackles. The 11 tackles were the most by any player on either team.

Special Teams Player of the Week—Chris Garnic, Cornell

The junior made 4-of-5 field goals and 4-of-5 extra points in the Big Red's 46-18 win over Princeton. Garnic booted field goals from 31, 18, 21 and 30 yards. He is now 13-for-16 in his career field goal attempts.

### **Week 1 in Review**

The first full weekend of Sprint Football featured two games involving head-to-head CSFL matchups. Navy raised its record to 2-0 on the season with a 10-6 victory over Pennsylvania. The Quakers took a 6-3 lead at 12:41 in the fourth quarter when quarterback James Donapel connected with Tim Murphy for an eight-yard completion. However, the Midshipmen regained the lead on their next possession as quarterback Chris Ashinhurst connected with Adam Matthews on a 54-yard touchdown pass. The Penn defense was impressive in the defeat, forcing nine Navy turnovers on the night.

Army opened its season with a 41-14 win over Cornell. The Big Red jumped out to a 7-0 lead, but the Black Knights stormed back with 41 straight points. Army's offense rolled up 475 total yards, with 328 coming in the first half. The Black Knights finished with 369 yards on the ground.

Princeton will open its season this Friday night.

Offensive Player of the Week—George Feagins, Army

The Black Knight quarterback came up with a dominating performance against Cornell. Feagins went 6-for-11 in passing for 113 yards and a touchdown in Army's 41-14 victory. He also rushed for another touchdown while racking up 120 yards.

Defensive Player of the Week—Charles Lewis, Navy

The junior recorded nine tackles in Navy's win over Penn. Seven of Lewis' tackles were unassisted. Lewis

also intercepted two passes and returned them for a total of 15 yards. Lewis has recorded 13 tackles this season.

Special Teams Player of the Week—Kurt Cheeseman, Army

Cheeseman racked up 11 points in Army's win at Cornell. Cheesman was 5-5 on extra points and was 2-2 on field goals. Both of Cheesman's field goals came from 27 yards out.

## **2003 SEASON PREVIEW**

With the 2003 season right around the corner, here is a look at how the CSFL shapes up in 2003. The team previews are listed in order of last year's finish.

**Navy** enters the 2003 season as the two-time defending champions, and a third straight title may be on the horizon. The Midshipmen return 17 starters from last year's team that rolled to a 7-0 record. Ten of the returning starters are on the offensive side of the ball, where Navy racked up 297 points last season.

Senior quarterback Chris Ashinhurst will once again lead the offense. Ashinhurst threw for 953 yards and 13 touchdowns in 2002 and added 151 rushing yards. Ashinhurst's top target will be senior wide receiver Adam Matthews, who is also coming off an impressive 2002 campaign. Matthews hauled in 20 passes for 335 yards and seven touchdowns. Senior running back Maurice Chapman will lead the Navy ground attack. Chapman accounted for 361 total yards last fall and led the team with eight touchdowns. Senior co-captain Brett Jones will anchor the Navy offensive line.

The defense will also have plenty of experienced players on the field. Co-captain Chris Zachary returns to the secondary after leading the team in tackles a year ago. Linebackers John Collins and John Schindel are back after combining for 71 tackles last season. Junior defensive end Dane Brown will lead the charge on the defensive line.

If not for two losses to the midshipmen, **Army** would have enjoyed a perfect season in 2002. The Black Knights haven't won the CSFL title since 1999, but there is plenty of confidence coming out of West Point. Army will have quarterback George Feagins back under center. Feagins played in four games last season after starting throughout the entire 2001 campaign. He will hand the ball off to running back Clay Bibb. The senior was one of the top rushers in the CSFL last season. He averaged 9.6 yards per carry and finished with 299 yards on the ground. Junior Austin Wilson brings speed to the wide receiving corp. He returns to the Black Knights this fall after missing the 2002 campaign. Wilson averaged 47 yards per catch as a freshman.

Junior Mike Kelvington will lead the way on defense for Army. The middle linebacker was credited with 23 tackles last year. Sophomores Brandon Kennedy and David Psiaki started all six contests as freshmen and gained valuable experience. Kennedy and Psiaki will anchor one of the top defensive lines in the league.

There are high hopes at **Penn** despite the loss of two key offensive stars. Running back Mark Gannon and wide receiver Jeff Bagnoli have graduated, but the Quakers appear to have plenty of reinforcements. Greg Bagnoli will start at running back after picking up 105 yards in Penn's season finale last fall. Wideout Patrick Monaghan should be the top target for two-time All-CSFL quarterback Jimmer Donapel. The

senior has thrown for 1,757 yards in three seasons and is looking to become the first Penn quarterback to throw for 2,000 yards in a career. Four starters return from an offensive line that allowed just 11 sacks in 2002. Junior Brian Baldwin will lead a talented front five.

The defensive line will feature 10 letterwinners from a year ago. Lineman John Pinto returns after picking up 31 tackles last season. Doug Pires also had 31 tackles a year ago and led the Quakers with five sacks. There is also depth at linebacker with Mike Russo and Chris Malachowski leading the way. The All-CSFL honorees combined for 48 tackles in 2002. The secondary is led by Ray June, who is one of the top cover corners in the league. June will be joined in the secondary by senior cornerback Chris Caputo.

**Cornell** was hit hard by graduation as 13 starters and 21 seniors were lost. However, the Big Red are counting on a host of talented youngsters to step up in 2003. The offense has depth at running back where as many as three backs will see significant playing time. The top returning running back is senior Dean Cocco, who carried the ball 11 times last season. There is experience at wide receiver with the return of Henry Kim and Michael Ormsby. The big question on offense is at quarterback, where three players are battling for the starting job. Cocco, Alex Macauley and Nick LiVigne are Cornell's quarterback candidates.

Nine of the starters that were lost came from the Cornell defense. There is experience in the secondary with the return of Timothy LaFrance and Matt Wesley. The Big Red will be looking to replace All-CSFL standout Eric Eisenhart at middle linebacker. There will be a new set of starting linebackers led by Billy Mascaro. There will also be a new group of starters on the defensive line. The kicking game will be boosted by the return of Chris Garnic, who was 4-for-4 on field goal attempts last season.

It is a new era at **Princeton**, where the Tigers are looking to erase the memory of a winless 2002 campaign. New head coach Bill Hickey takes over after serving as an assistant for the past two seasons. There will be several new faces in the lineup, but Princeton will have experience at quarterback. Dennis Bakke will likely start under center with L.T. Lawler serving as the backup. Lawler may also see time at running back. The wide receivers are young, so Bakke's experience will help the young Tigers grow throughout the season.

The Princeton defense will get a boost in the secondary with the return of Ned Bartlett. Co-captain Taylor Bright is another returning starter at middle linebacker. Aaron Bianco is one of the most versatile players on the roster and will likely see time on both offense and defense.
